The employers gave each servant a box containing gifts and bonuses (and sometimes leftover food). The tradition has been dated to the middle ages. However, in modern times Boxing Day has become a big shopping day where stores open very early and offer deep discounts, very similar to the day after Thanksgiving in the United States.

Christmas at the National Harbor is amazing! The decor includes a 65-foot tall Christmas tree made of synthetic "candy" glass, sparkling icicles lighting up the 20-story atrium, a miniature Potomac Express Train Village and much more. It's a winter wonderland created entirely of 5,000 blocks of ice weighing 2 MILLION POUNDS! hand-sculpted by 40 international artisans and kept at a chilling nine degrees Fahrenheit. 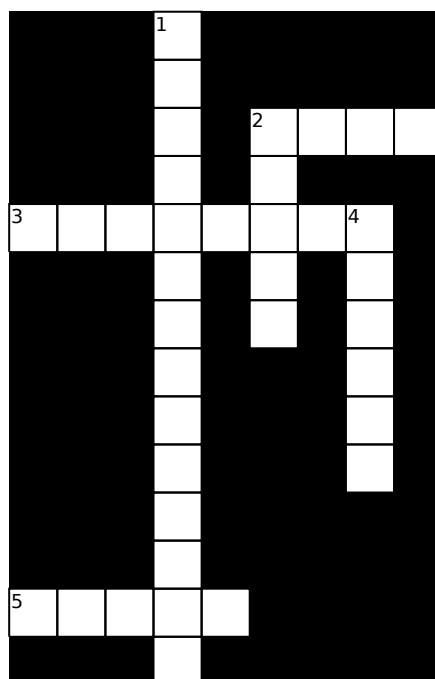

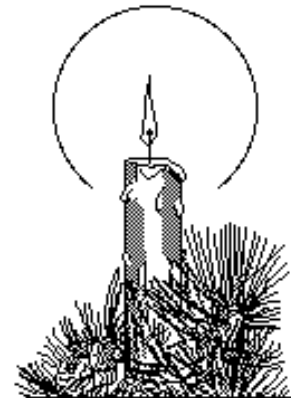
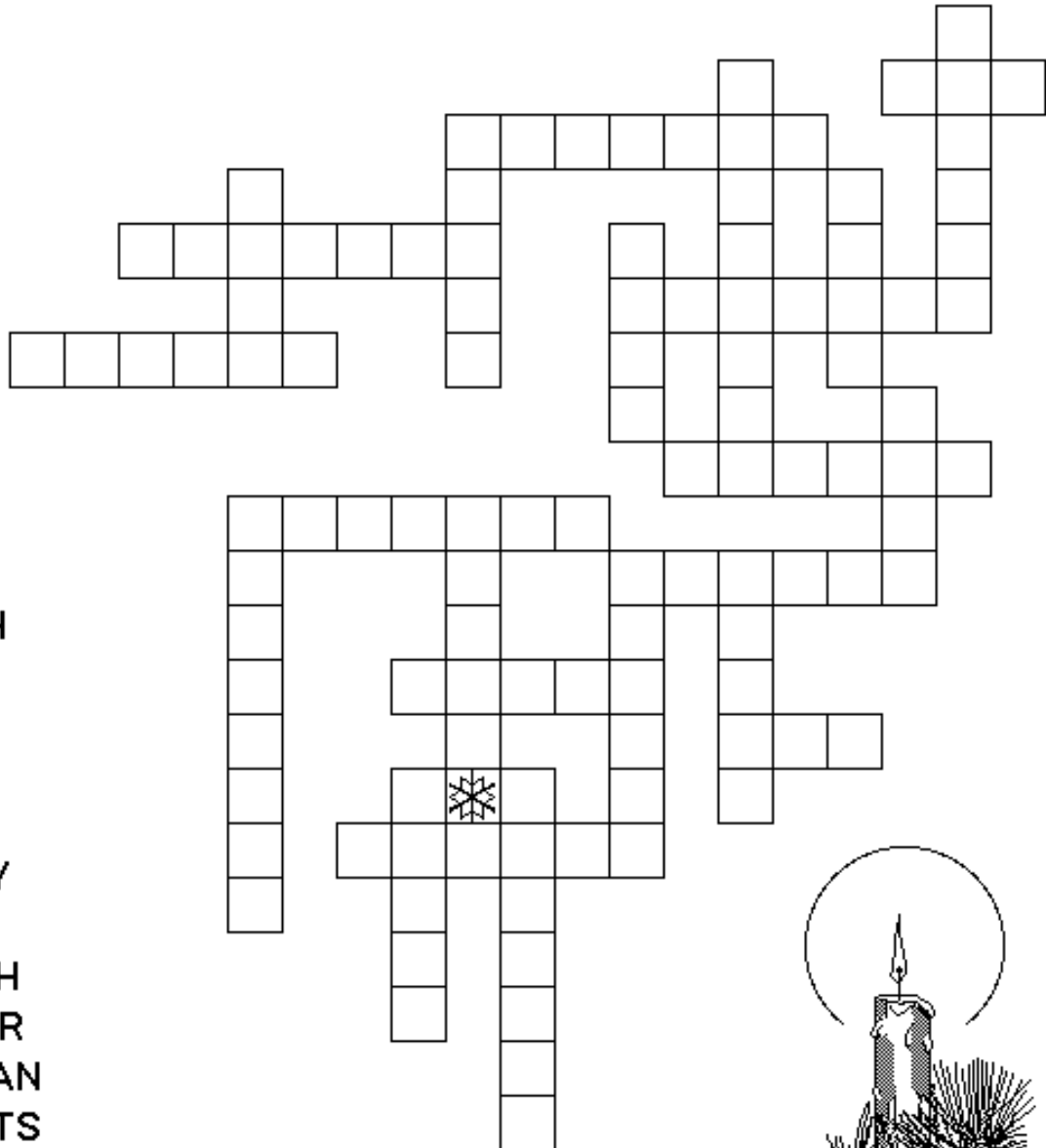
